Proposed Agenda for Meeting #3

June 27, Port Canaveral

- ▶ **Review existing transportation system and potential future transportation investments in the study area (FDOT, MPOs, Port, Airports, Spaceport, etc.)**
 - » Include update on Central Florida Expressway Authority
- ▶ **Identify potential regional transportation connectivity gaps (business and economic development organizations)**
- ▶ **Discuss potential coordination opportunities with utilities and other infrastructure**
- ▶ **Continue development of guiding principles**
- ▶ **Discuss potential corridor need and alternatives**



Next Steps: Technical Analysis

▶ Conservation

- » Develop regional framework building on prior work (Seven Jewels, NRORS, CLIP, etc.); emphasis on landscape-scale connectivity needs
- » Coordinate with environmental framework for North Ranch Sector Plan
- » Coordinate with Central Florida Water Initiative re potential solutions and needs for moving water

▶ Countryside

- » Explore long-term trends in agriculture
- » Document agricultural connectivity needs



Next Steps: Technical Analysis

▶ Centers

- » Explore impacts of changing demographic trends
- » Continue coordination with local governments, MPOs to reconcile future population forecasts and buildout assumptions

▶ Corridors

- » Document needs and deficiencies on existing system
- » Document statewide/interregional travel needs in this area (people and freight)
- » Map current travel flows between centers based on available data (people and freight)
- » Estimate future travel flows between centers; may need multiple scenarios
- » Identify potential transportation connectivity gaps



Next Steps: Technical Advisory Group

- ▶ **Executive Order:** Task Force chair may appoint Technical Advisory Group(s) as needed to assist in the work of the Task Force; such groups may include qualified persons not on the Task Force
- ▶ **Proposal for discussion next meeting:** create Technical Advisory Group(s) to assist in review of data and evaluation of corridor alternatives
 - » Potential membership: Local governments, metropolitan planning organizations, regional planning council, water management districts, economic development organizations, etc.

About the Task Force

Governor Rick Scott signed [Executive Order 13-319](#) on November 1st, 2013 creating the **East Central Florida Corridor Task Force**. The purpose of the Task Force is to evaluate and develop recommendations on land use, transportation, and environmental planning for portions of Brevard, Orange, and Osceola counties.

The Task Force is part of a broader statewide Future Corridors effort to coordinate future land uses and the supporting transportation network, and will serve as a pilot planning effort to be tested and evaluated for use in other future corridor planning efforts statewide. Well planned communities, major transportation corridors, and protections of the state's unique environmental and agricultural resources are critical to the state's economic competitiveness and quality of life. The Task Force will build upon the *How Shall We Grow?* regional vision supported by an analysis of land use, mobility, economic, environmental, water, and community issues in the study area.

The charge of the Task Force includes the identification of anticipated future development patterns and associated mobility and connectivity needs in portions of Brevard, Orange, and Osceola counties, as well as potential solutions for addressing these needs through coordinated planning and partnerships. The Task Force will involve stakeholders and the public as it develops its recommendations.
